The board agreed to pay that fee.

Pete had suggested at the last meeting that our members prepare and serve lunch to the judges in an attempt to break even or maybe make money on our show. The board discussed the logistics of serving lunch and concluded that we would purchase lunch for the judges and their guest, if any, rather than try to do it ourselves. (Pete warned me that he has assigned everyone a job at the show without including lunch preparations.) We will increase the prices of the plants we sell to cover the estimated cost of the lunch. It was also decided not to have a raffle, but to give every show visitor a ticket for a drawing to be held at the end of the show for a plant. No shipping charges will be provided but I offered to make a sincere attempt to deliver the plant to the winner. Must remember to make "we do not ship" sign.

My wife, Maria and I own the Dover Nursery east of Sandy, Oregon. This is a second generation nursery that specializes in rhododendrons, with an emphasis on species, plants with outstanding foliage, and rare and hard to find varieties. We propagate over 600 different rhododendron cultivars each year and another 100 varieties of deciduous azaleas including the several cultivars of the NW native occidentale and several eastern native azaleas. Our operation covers about 30 acres of field grown rhododendrons and approximately 2 acres of greenhouses where we grow many of the small and sward varieties.

Our travels include many of the fine gardens of Great Britain and Europe. We recently spent 5 weeks in SW China (Yunnan, Sichuan, eastern Tibet) with the Rhododendron Species Foundation searching for new species of rhododendrons. My talk will center around the discovery of species rhododendrons, where they were discovered, and the plant hunters who discovered them.

April 24th, 25th, 26th



1. **Small plant of the month** – calostotum (species) 2' -5' midseason Saucer shaped flowers are a rich purple w/ crimson spots. With aromatic leaves and the lower surface densely covered w/ cinnamon colored scales.
2. **Noyo Snow (white)** 3' midseason yak x arboreum The buds will be purplish pink and open to a pale purplish pink at the edge. The flowers will fade to a yellowish white on opening.
3. **Orange plant of the month** – “Avery” a Thompson cross named for Michelle and Pat’s daughter. Mauna Loa x Unique Marmalade – looks like a frilled Orange Cameo with a darker center.
4. **Surprise plant of the month** – N.E. x Ring of fire 4' midseason this is a Merle Sanders plant and it is yellow.
